Did you know the Melbourne Planetarium offers [Skynotes](#), a guide to what is happening in the sky each month of the year.

You can read about phases of the moon, the visibility of planets, movement of meteor showers and information about the First Nations Night Sky. You can track the movements of the International Space Station and wave as they go by. (Hint: they probably won't see you, but wave anyway.....)

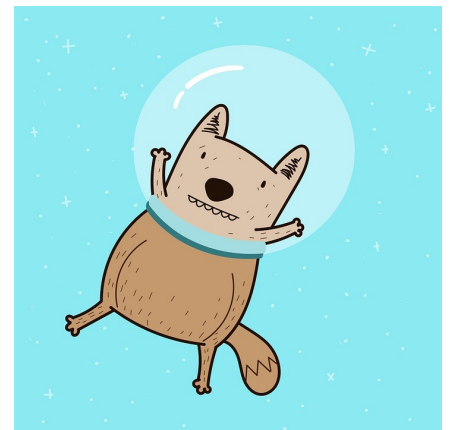
It's daylight now, it's such a long time to wait until the stars come out. What will I do until then?
