About this progress report

In 2021, Council launched the 'Help Shape Wyndham's Future' project to refresh the existing Wyndham 2040 Community Vision. This included a deliberative community engagement process that identified a set of place based priorities to be achieved over the life of the Vision.

Achieving the Community Vision requires everyone to work together. Everyone who lives, works, studies or visits the municipality has a role to play in helping achieve the Wyndham 2040 Community Vision. As do all levels of government, businesses, industry groups and community organisations.

This progress report provides the community with information as to what the Council has delivered in the 2021/22 financial year towards the implementation of community's place based priorities.

It also provides results against the indicators that have been assigned to each theme of the Vision to track progress, some of which were sourced from the Tracking the Community Vision Survey which was undertaken using the People's Advisory Panel in June/July 2022.

About the Tracking Community Vision Survey

The Tracking the Wyndham 2040 Community Vision Survey 2021/22 measures a wide range of social, economic, and land use issues aimed at gaining a sense of how satisfied residents are with aspects of living in Wyndham.

It is one of a few indicator sources for tracking the four themes of the Wyndham 2040 Community Vision. In line with Council's commitment to tracking the progress of the Community Vision, it will be undertaken every 2 years.

The survey was completed by a representative sample of 390 members of the People's Advisory Panel. Council received 225 surveys (190 were fully completed).



Understanding the Wyndham 2040 Community Vision

THE COMMUNITY'S VISION FOR WYNDHAM IN 2040 IS:

"A safe, connected and inclusive community. We respect, acknowledge, value and celebrate the First Nations people, our heritage, cultural diversity and multicultural strengths.

Our community has the infrastructure and services it needs to support holistic health and wellbeing for all. Local employment and education facilities are plentiful, and there are a variety of recreational, leisure, tourism, art and cultural opportunities for everyone to experience throughout the municipality.

We preserve our natural environment and rural lifestyle; we are able to get around easily and get to where we want to go efficiently. We are self-sufficient and pride ourselves on being green and sustainable."



What's it like to live in Wyndham?

68% agree that residents in Wyndham enjoy a good standard of living

61% agree that Wyndham is a place for creativity, arts and cultural connection

70% agree that their local neighbourhood is safe and family friendly

58% agree that their recreational needs are met in their local area

81% feel safe during the day, but **27% feel unsafe** during the night. The main reasons for feeling unsafe at night include:

- Lack of street lights
- Gender
- Lack of security cameras in public spaces
- Lack of police presence
- High youth presence

54% agree that there are enough opportunities to connect socially with people in their local area

What do we know about resident's health in Wyndham?

According to the Victorian Population Health survey:

23% of the Wyndham population is obese

Only 38% of adults are engaging in sufficient physical activity

42% reported their health as excellent or very good

25% adults reported high or very high levels of psychological distress with the prevalence of depression and anxiety being 26%

23% of adults reported low to medium levels of satisfaction with life

19% of adults smoked

From the Tracking the Vision survey, respondents ranked the following

Physical Health

73% of respondents rated their Physical Health as either good or very good

Mental Health

74% of respondents rated their Mental Health as either good or very good





What's it like for residents to access the services they need in Wyndham?

41% agree that there are adequate support services for vulnerable community members

75% agree that they can access the community health services they need (e.g. GPs, Dentists)

55% agree that they can access the specialist and hospital services they need

50% agree that they can access the family (early learning, child care, after school care) services they need.(20% didn't know)

How do residents feel about diversity and inclusion?

80% agree that Wyndham is a welcoming and inclusive City

81% are comfortable with the diversity in their local area including the different languages and styles of dress around

59% agree that Wyndham celebrates its First Nations people as cultural custodians

13% of respondents said they had experienced discrimination due to their cultural background

51% felt that multiculturalism improved life in their local area (VPHS, 2020)

What's it like to live in Wyndham?

73% agree that there are good natural environments in their local area and 60% agree that they are well managed.

76% agree that there are good open spaces in their local area

60% agree that they like the look and feel (character) of their neighbourhood

59% agree that public areas (e.g. parks, footpaths, facilities) are accessible for people with a disability

57% are satisfied with the quality of the playgrounds in their local area

57% are satisfied with the recreational opportunities in their local parks (e.g. exercise areas, BBQs, off-leash dog areas)

How do residents feel about getting around?


42% agree that public transport is improving


65% agree that are able to walk or cycle to destinations such as schools, shops, bus or train stations in their local area with **57% saying** they regularly walk to cycle to local destinations

26% agree that traffic congestion is improving

37% agree that if they choose to, they are able to get to where they want to go without a car

12% used bus services daily to get around in Wyndham





What are residents' attitudes and concerns relating to climate change?

67% agree that they are aware of the impacts of climate change on Wyndham

84% are concerned about it and **84% agree** that climate change needs to be addressed now

Residents Top Three concerns are:

- 1. Pollution
- 2. Weather changes
- 3. Rising Sea/Water Levels

81% have a good understanding of what they can do to reduce their impacts on the climate

Most residents feel best prepared for heat events and/heatwaves but **72% of residents** have not made any changes to their home or lifestyle to adapt to any extreme weather events

The biggest barriers to taking action to reduce impacts include:

- Lack of viable alternatives
- Not having the finances
- Not knowing what to do


Residents are already doing a lot to reduce their impacts on the climate including these examples provided:

63% always recycle correctly

55% always limit the food they throw out



Year 3 actions from Wyndham's Volunteering Strategy 2019-2024 continue to strengthen the local volunteering sector and increase the numbers of volunteers in Wyndham. 


