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Understanding the Wyndham 2040 Community Vision

In 2021, the Council engaged the community to update the Wyndham 2040 Community Vision. As a result of an extensive and deliberative consultation process, the community came up with the following vision for Wyndham:

"A safe, connected and inclusive community. We respect, acknowledge, value and celebrate the First Nations people, our heritage, cultural diversity and multicultural strengths.

Our community has the infrastructure and services it needs to support holistic health and wellbeing for all. Local employment and education facilities are plentiful, and there are a variety of recreational, leisure, tourism, art and cultural opportunities for everyone to experience throughout the municipality.


We preserve our natural environment and rural lifestyle; we are able to get around easily and get to where we want to go efficiently. We are self-sufficient and pride ourselves on being green and sustainable."

People & Community

Community members are collaborative participants in creating strong, supportive and environmentally sustainable neighbourhoods.

Priorities related to health

The Local Government Act requires Council to provide good governance in its municipal district for the benefit and wellbeing of the municipal community. Through its Council Plan goal of delivering a healthy and accessible community, Council works to influence the health and wellbeing of Wyndham residents through the provision of services, programs and infrastructure. In turn, the Public Health and Wellbeing Act requires Council to have a Municipal Public Health and Wellbeing plan to guide its work to make Wyndham a municipality where people can achieve maximum health and wellbeing.

Whilst Council is plays a limited role in delivering health services such Maternal Child Health Services, Council is not a direct provider of hospitals or core health services, through its Council Plan, Council has committed to the *provision of high-quality*, equitable and accessible services and community facilities that cater for all ages and life stages as well as to advocate and plan for increased investment in health and support services to improve the wellbeing outcomes of all residents.

Priorities related to safety

Whilst Council is not a direct provider of policing or security, it does have an important role to play in relation to community safety. Council can enact local laws to deal with important community safety, peace and order issues such as public health, management of council property, environment and amenity. Local laws often apply to noise, fire hazards, abandoned vehicles, parking permits, disabled parking, furniture on footpaths, graffiti, burning off, animals in public spaces and nuisance pets. Council

also has a role to play as an advocate for the municipality, working with relevant stakeholders and Federal and Victorian Governments to ensure issues affecting the municipality are heard and community concerns are addressed.

Through its Council Plan, Council has committed to *protecting* and promoting community safety.

Through its Council Plan, Council has committed to the *provision* of high-quality, equitable and accessible services and community facilities that cater for all ages and life stages and to the delivery, support and promotion of creative industries including the arts, events and festivals that contribute to the vibrancy and liveability of the City.

Growth has been managed effectively and we have the infrastructure, services, housing types, jobs, education and recreation opportunities required to support a good quality of life for residents of all ages and abilities.

The city, coast and country elements of the municipality continue to be protected and enhanced through thoughtful and innovative planning and appropriate development.

People are able to move around Wyndham easily. They are able get to where they want to go efficiently and with greater access to active, accessible and sustainable modes of transport.

Our parks and open spaces encourage people to be active and connect them with nature and the outdoors.

Wyndham provides safe and welcoming destinations for residents and visitors.

Priorities related to open and green spaces

Public open spaces play a vital role in the life of a community and are highly valued because they provide the space for exercising, playing and watching outdoor sports, meeting, socialising with friends and family or relaxing and unwinding. Council has many roles to play in this space, starting with how land is used and how developments are designed. Council is also the primary owner and manager of open spaces for its residents, workers

and visitors and is the key decision maker about open space and how it is planned, provided, developed, used and managed.

Through its Council Plan, Council has committed to encouraging residents to be physically active and healthy through the provision of accessible and diverse sporting facilities, leisure and recreational opportunities.

Whilst Council is not a direct provider of public transport, it does have a role to advocate for the municipality, working with relevant stakeholders and Federal and Victorian Governments to ensure issues affecting the municipality are heard and community concerns are addressed.

Through its Council Plan, Council has committed to delivering and advocating for a quality, sustainable and accessible transport network that enables the community to move around the city easily. Over the past few years Council has been fostering active transport through the provision of bike and footpaths.

Priorities related to roads

One of the biggest challenges for a growth area Council, is to ensure the required infrastructure and services are properly in place before residents move in. Roads are a major part of that infrastructure, and whilst Council currently has ownership and responsibility for over \$3.4 billion of community assets, including infrastructure such as roads, drains, buildings, and open spaces, it does not provide all roads and associated infrastructure needed by the community. As such, Council also has a role to play as an advocate for the municipality, working with relevant

stakeholders and Federal and Victorian Governments to ensure issues affecting the municipality are heard and community concerns are addressed.

Through its Council Plan, Council has committed to the provision of sustainable infrastructure through the construction of new assets and renewal of existing assets, and to the creation of neighbourhoods which allow residents to get around easily.

- spent \$20.26 million on roads including the following works to improve our local road network:
 - a \$5 million rehabilitation of Sayers Road (between Tarneit Road and Reflections Boulevard) in Tarneit
 - Boundary and Davis Road intersection upgrade, Mount Cottrell
 - rebuilding 12 local roads and resurfacing another 49 through our annual Road Reconstructions Program and Road Surface Renewal Program
- constructed 58.7kms of roads
- graded 279kms of roads
- completed 9,688 reactive repair works on roads
- swept 22,083kms of roads
- · constructed 106.1kms of new footpaths
- repaired 13,220m2 of footpaths
- inspected 4,535kms of roads and identified 2,261 defects
- inspected 2,413kms of footpath and identified 31,700 defects.

Wyndham Westlink

Commitment made by the Victorian Government for \$58 million towards the Ison Rd Rail Overpass and Freeway interchange. This complements the funding committed by the Federal Government in May 2022 in a 50/50 funding split to enable construction to start in 2023/24.

Additional transport commitments made by the Victorian Government outside Council's Road priorities included:

- \$120m to improve Ballan Road, upgrading the intersections of McGrath and Greens Road.
- \$5m for a traffic management action plan for Wyndham.
- \$79m for the Point Cook Road and the Central Avenue intersection including introducing lights to the intersection and widening Central Avenue to Skehan Boulevard.

Outer Metropolitan Ring Transport Corridor

In the Federal budget submission Council has advocated for the Outer Metropolitan Ring Transport Corridor to be fully funded to improve transport connectivity in the north and west of Melbourne between key employment and residential growth areas and to link key transport hubs.

Priorities relating to community infrastructure

The ownership and care of assets owned in common by the community is a core Council service. No other organisation can do this on behalf of the Wyndham community. The responsibility to care for the community's assets brings the expectation that Council will ensure assets are fit for purpose, safe and managed to minimise whole of life costs. As Wyndham ages, the maintenance, renewal and replacement of assets will have a significant impact on Council's financial operations and long-

term financial sustainability. For this reason, ensuring Council's work is guided by community input, strong evidence and data is critical to ensuring that Council can continue to deliver the wide variety of work it does into the future within available resources.

Through its Council Plan, Council has committed to aligning service delivery expectations with available funding so that the sustainable management of all required supporting assets is achieved.
