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## The Myndham 2040 Community Vision

#### The Community's Vision for Wyndham in 2040 is:

Our community has the infrastructure and services it needs to support holistic health and wellbeing for all. Local

employment and education facilities are plentiful, and there are a variety of recreational, leisure, tourism, art and cultural opportunities for everyone to experience throughout the municipality.

We preserve our natural environment and rural lifestyle; we are able to get around easily and get to where we want to go efficiently. We are self-sufficient and pride ourselves on being green and sustainable." This vision is supported by the following four themes, which further describe the community's aspirations for the future of Wyndham as written by our community in 2016 and refreshed in 2021.

This is the final progress report before the Council is required to review the Community Vision as part of the deliberative community engagement process that will take place in 2025.







## Tracking the Vision Survey 2024

### **Demographics**

The Tracking the Community Vision survey was completed by members of Wyndham's People's Advisory Panel between 7 May 2024 and 28 May 2024. Council received 252 surveys.













## People & Community



From the Tracking the Vision Survey, respondents ranked the following on a scale from 1 to 5 stars (1 being very poor, 5 being very good):

The 2023 Victorian Population Health Survey are the latest available at local Government level. Updated results are expected to be released by the State Government in early 2025.

39%

of the adult Wyndham population reported experiencing discrimination (includes due to their sexuality, cultural background, gender or religious beliefs or other).

Of those respondents who reported experiencing discrimination,

18%

experienced discrimination due to their cultural background.

## Priorities related to health

The Local Government Act requires Council to provide good governance in its municipal district for the benefit and wellbeing of the municipal community. Through its Council Plan goal of delivering a healthy and accessible community, Council works to influence the health and wellbeing of Wyndham residents through the provision of services, programs and infrastructure. In turn, the Public Health and Wellbeing Act requires Council to have a Municipal Public Health and Wellbeing plan to guide its work to make Wyndham a municipality where people can achieve maximum health and wellbeing.

Whilst Council plays a limited role in delivering health services such Maternal Child Health Services, Council is not a direct provider of hospitals or core health services, through its Council Plan, Council has committed to the *provision of high-quality*, equitable and accessible services and community facilities that cater for all ages and life stages as well as to advocate and plan for increased investment in health and support services to improve the wellbeing outcomes of all residents

## Priorities related to safety

Whilst Council is not a direct provider of policing or security, it does have an important role to play in relation to community safety. Council can enact local laws to deal with important community safety, peace and order issues such as public health, management of council property, environment and amenity.

Local laws often apply to noise, fire hazards, abandoned vehicles, parking permits, disabled parking, furniture on footpaths, graffiti, burning off, animals in public spaces and nuisance pets. Council

also has a role to play as an advocate for the municipality, working with relevant stakeholders and Federal and Victorian Governments to ensure issues affecting the municipality are heard and community concerns are addressed.

Through its Council Plan, Council has committed to *protecting* and promoting community safety.

Council is a major provider of community centres and/or hubs which provide a range of services, activities and programs that are low-cost for all ages and interests. Some centres are integrated with library services, youth services and customer

service desks. Council is also proud of the suite of events it hosts and supports each year. All events are promoted on Council's website 'What's On'.

Through its Council Plan, Council has committed to the *provision* of high-quality, equitable and accessible services and community facilities that cater for all ages and life stages and to the delivery, support and promotion of creative industries including the arts, events and festivals that contribute to the vibrancy and liveability of the City.

Most residents feel best prepared for heat events and/ heatwaves but 73% of residents have not made any changes to their home or lifestyle to adapt to any extreme weather events

#### The biggest barriers to taking action to reduce impacts include:

- 1. Lack of viable alternatives
- 2. Not having the finances
- 3. And not knowing what to do

Residents are already doing a lot to reduce their impacts on the climate including these examples provided:

always recycle correctly.

always limit the food they throw out.

always buy energy efficient household appliances.

are considering switching their gas appliances over to electric applicances. always limit the energy they use to heat and cool their home.

always use renewable energy (such as solar) to meet their household's energy use.

always reduce their meat intake.

## Priorities related to open and green spaces

Public open spaces play a vital role in the life of a community and are highly valued because they provide the space for exercising, playing and watching outdoor sports, meeting, socialising with friends and family or relaxing and unwinding. Council has many roles to play in this space, starting with how land is used and how developments are designed. Council is also the primary owner and manager of open spaces for its







		With almost 50 per cent of people living in Wyndham born overseas, the community engagement team has been working on broadening their reach to ensure more diverse participation in Council project engagement. Focus sessions were established with language groups identified as having low English proficiency.
		Council has launched community engagement videos which are translated into seven different languages. This, more accessible format allows community members to understand more about what community engagement is, how to get involved and the advantages of signing up for <a href="The Loop">The Loop</a> to stay up to date on projects that are of interest to them.
		Between April to May 2023, Council recruited new members of the <u>People's Advisory Panel</u> to assist to further representation from each Ward of the community to ensure that Council hear from the community to inform their decision making. Examples of key projects panel members have participated in the development of are, the <u>Annual Plan and Budget 2023-24</u> , Council's Customer Experience Strategy, and Council's emergency preparedness brochures and communication.
		Wyndham News magazine is a monthly magazine for residents to keep up to date about Council's key projects, initiatives, major events as well as programs and activities in the local community. The magazine is published monthly and is available online and delivered to all residential addresses in Wyndham.
